February 7-10, 2012 Santo Domingo

In February 2012, we will join our Dominican friends and colleagues to celebrate 50 years of continuous service in the Dominican Republic. We want to honor the accomplishments of Peace Corps and the Dominican Pueblo. We will begin with an Opening Reception on Tuesday evening, February 7th followed by three days of programmed activities, Wednesday through Friday, February 8th, 9th and 10th in Santo Domingo. The official program will be followed by optional opportunities for short excursions and travel to old sites and friends away from the capital.

An ice cream social at the end of the day will provide an opportunity to meet and mix with current Volunteers, together with old and new friends. Afterwards, take a Volunteer out to dinner!

Thursday, Feb. 9: A shortened day dedicated to *Reconnecting and Remembering* our individual and group time of service—a look at our shared history through our own discussions; words from noted Dominican historian Frank Moya Pons; a panel discussion by former PC Directors; and a look at some of Peace Corps' Enduring Legacies. A buffet/working lunch organized by program sectors with facilitators will focus on discussing the historical evolution of programs and projects, providing valuable information for our 50th Anniversary History Project. At night we anticipate a grand reception offered by the US Ambassador [date to be confirmed].

Friday, Feb. 10: Our final day will begin with a keynote by our own Aaron Williams, US Peace Corps Director, and a morning of activities dedicated to *Third Goal and/or Continuing Service* opportunities. We will feature short overviews of the missions and accomplishments of the sponsoring organizations, followed by a variety of workshops related to the Third Goal and Continuing Service. Examples include:

TRAINING HELPS ECO-TOURISM GUIDES IMPROVE THEIR BUSINESS

A FQ grant was used for a training course on caves for eco-tourism guides of the Pedro Sanchez Guides' Association. Thanks to the trainings, the guides are now able to include as part of their tours an explanation of the formation of the caves, the pictographs in the caves, and the practices to conserve the caves.

As part of the training, the guides also learned how to keep their audiences intrigued and how to make small improvements to their trails. The training has raised the quality of the guides' tours to the point that the guides are now able to charge a competitive price in the market. The guides have also attracted the attention of tour operators and outside institutions. The increased interest in the site and the tours has resulted in more visitors and more income for the guides and their families.

A positive unexpected result of the trainings is a newfound interest in geology among the guides. The guides have taken it upon themselves to expand their research beyond the trainings to continue learning about geology, with a focus on the specific geology of their geographic region. This allows the guides to continue to improve the quality of their tours. This training was a huge success. Thank you for making it happen!

FONDO QUISQUEYA 50 FOR 50

In February 2012, we will celebrate 50 years of Peace Corps in the Dominican Republic. On that occasion we will also celebrate the 25th anniversary of Fondo Quisqueya. For 25 years, Fondo Quisqueya has been providing grants and scholarships to deserving and needy Dominicans for various types of training and education in diverse professional, vocational and life skills areas. More than \$120,000 has been donated to some 680 individuals and groups for training and education and more than \$23,000 to help hurricane-damaged schools in the Dominican Republic.

Fondo Q is managed and administered by an entirely volunteer Board of Directors and depends on the generous support of former Peace Corps volunteers and staff and of friends and families. At the outset, the Board made the decision to put 10% of all contributions into a reserve fund for special needs and sustainability. For example, most of the funding for hurricane-damaged schools was allocated from this fund. This fund currently has around \$25,000, depending on the ups and downs of the market. To celebrate the 50th anniversary of Peace Corps in the Dominican Republic and the 25th Anniversary of Fondo Quisqueya, the Board is launching a one-time giving campaign to increase that fund to \$50,000. We are asking all former PCDR volunteers and staff, and families and friends, for a **one time fund gift** in addition to your normal giving to Fondo Quisqueya. The regular annual giving will continue to support the extremely successful grants and scholarships that have helped so many Dominicans in their lives and careers. The **one time fund gift** will go directly to the reserve fund for special needs and sustainability.

FONDO Q'S GRANTS & SELECTION PROCESS

The Fondo Quisqueya Foundation, Inc. ("FQ") is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization which was formed in 1987 by former Peace Corps Volunteers and Staff who had served in the Dominican Republic ("DR") and who wanted to give something back to the DR. FQ was incorporated in Virginia in 1993.

FQ provides low-income Dominicans with scholarships and grants for both traditional and non-traditional in-country education and training to assist them in bettering their lives and to help them attain personal development, skills, and advancement. Grants may be to groups of individuals such as members of a coffee cooperative or a women's group.

FQ's grants and scholarships are made possible through donations and in-kind support from ex-PCVs and PC staff and other friends of the DR. FQ has no paid staff. Examples of courses funded include accounting, diesel mechanics, beautician school, barber training, driver training, worm composting, bee-keeping, construction and cement skills, painting, journalism, mangrove restoration, ecotourism, inverter repair, graphic design, English, and computer classes. Funds can be used for tuition, transportation, books and materials, and other expenses associated with the course or training.

Each applicant must be sponsored by a member of the Dominican community or by a Peace Corps DR Volunteer or staff member.

Individual grants and scholarships usually do not exceed US\$300. FQ's Local DR Committee reviews grant applications quarterly and makes recommendations to FQ's Board of Directors for selection. Funds permitting, the Board seeks to fund at least a total of US\$3,000 in scholarships each quarter, for a yearly total of at least US\$12,000. Please donate now. Help our grantees help themselves.

FONDO Q GRANTEES

Fondo Q normally awards grants and scholarships four times per year. Applicants are screened by Fondo Q's Local DR Committee. Most of the awards are for \$300 or less. Below are summaries of the grants and scholarships awarded during the last quarter of 2010 and the first quarter of 2011, which include 10 group awards benefitting more than 100 recipients in addition to 8 individual awards. These awards have provided funding for courses in subjects including journalism; graphic design and computer repair; mangrove restoration; sustainable lobster fishery training; barber training; and English.

DR DOCUMENTARY PROJECT

As Stanley Meisler noted in his recent book, *When the World Calls: The Inside Story of the Peace Corps and Its First Fifty Years*, "The Peace Corps has always brimmed with pride over the deportment of the Volunteers during the U.S. invasion of the Dominican Republic during a civil war in 1965. The Volunteers in the capital of Santo Domingo refused to leave despite heavy fire and bloody mayhem. They rushed to hospitals that were bereft of power and supplies and, amid awful, searing scenes, cared for the wounded, some cut down by U.S. marines and paratroopers. Despite muzzles from Washington, they sided with their impoverished Dominican friends and cried out against U.S. intervention. It was a glowing moment in Peace Corps history."

Although it was an exceptional and unique experience for DR Volunteers, it exemplifies the Peace Corps' ideals as carried out by over 200,000 Volunteers who have served throughout the world. This episode in Peace Corps history validates the vision of John F. Kennedy as shaped and carried out by Sargent Shriver.

This documentary will use interviews with past and present staff and volunteers and Dominicans, actual footage from the Dominican Republic of current and historic events, newsreels, photographs, and possibly even some reenactments from the recent play about the Peace Corps in the Dominican Republic during the revolution.

ENGLISH CLASSES PROVIDE NEW OPPORTUNITIES

English classes funded by Fondo Quisqueya have provided new opportunities for Alexander (Alex) Perez Vilorio and Edelmira Rosa. For Alex, the classes have given him a greater sense of self-assurance. As it had been a year since he had graduated high school, he was beginning to question whether he would ever have the opportunity to continue studying. This course has enabled him to “get back on the wagon,” and he is already talking about registering at a university sometime in the near future. He would like to study law. The opportunity to study English has also given Alex a greater vocabulary to use when working as a tour guide and when selling the jewelry he designs to foreigners. Additionally, an unexpected benefit of taking the class is that his professor has also identified the possibility of him working with Canadian volunteers in Hato Mayor once the course ends. This would be another way for Alex to continue practicing his English and to gain professional experience.

For Edelmira, the opportunity to continue studying English has shown her that it is never too late to develop a new professional skill. As a cocoa farmer, a wife, a mother, and a grandmother, she could have easily felt like she had a lot on her plate, but instead she desired to go above and beyond the *campo* norm. Her new course has reignited her interest in school and especially languages, and she knows that she will be able to apply what she learns to her work as a tour guide and to her responsibilities at the regional cacao growers' organization.
