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FROM THE PRESIDENT'S CORNER

Happy Spring 2013! That almost rhymes. I hope this issue of FQ's newsletter finds you enjoying good weather and good health!

I want to take the President's Corner to highlight some opportunities you have, as donors (or potential donors), to earmark your contributions. FQ has, in addition to its general fund for grants/scholarships, four ways in which you can direct your giving. First, for nearly a decade now, FQ has been host to the Mila Brooks Fund, for scholarships providing education and training exclusively to women and young girls. Mila Brooks was the first female Director of the Peace Corps in the Dominican Republic and had the additional distinction of being the driving force and sponsor of the 25th Anniversary Celebration of Peace Corps in the DR, at which time the idea of FQ was born. Mila's career took her to many developing countries where she worked with many programs, none closer to her heart than those that impact women. (Read more about Mila Brooks later in this issue.)

Second, since 2006 we have received substantial donations from the Fox Foundation, through Frances Price in memory of her mother, Elaine Fox, for scholarships related to conservation training. The scholarships provided by this fund have included training of tourist guides in a national park, coral reef preservation, restoration of mangroves, training for fishermen's associations, and training and education for youth who are members of Peace Corps-sponsored "Brigada Verde" groups. The opportunities with these funds have been very exciting for grantees involved with environmental sustainability.

Third, at the 50th Anniversary Celebration of Peace Corps in the DR, FQ's endowment/reserve fund was named the "B.J Warren Endowment Fund," to honor FQ's Vice President, B.J Warren, one of the founders of FQ and a past president, for her instrumental role in the life of Peace Corps, FQ, Friends of the Dominican Republic, and her example to humanity for her generosity of service, spirit, kindness, and love. The fund, while focused on our endowment goal, also acts

Upon his passing, Lou's family asked that his memory be honored through donations to FQ. Several thousand dollars have been contributed so far, and those dedicated donations continue. As Mary, Lou's widow, commented recently, "Wouldn't Lou have been amazed!"

Thus, your donations have the opportunity to honor many individuals and their contributions, by supporting both general grants and specific areas of interest. And I should mention that anytime your check or online donation provides an indication that you would like to earmark it, for one of the purposes above or, outside of these, to honor someone or more than one person (as a memorial, for a birthday, etc.), FQ will publish that instruction in our Honor Roll of Donors.

REMEMBERING LOU

Lou Ferrand, a FQ founder and its past Treasurer and President, passed away on December 29, 2012. His life was celebrated at a beautiful memorial service on January 12, 2013, at the Unitarian Universalist Church in Arlington, VA. Below are some remembrances from current FQ board members about their own relationship with Lou.

Sue and the kids and I arrived in the DR in June of 1967. I was the new associate director for urban, health, and co-op programs, replacing BJ Warren. One of the first co-op Volunteers I met was Lou Ferrand. I would enjoy my visits to Lou in Neiba—first, because he was always so enthusiastic about his work with the grape co-op there; second, because it was obvious that folks there loved him and he was having a great impact on their lives; and third, because he had indoor plumbing, which made the overnight stay easier. And, speaking of



overnight stays, Lou would usually stay with us when he came to Santo Domingo, which was always enjoyable. I remember when he finally somehow worked a deal with the Dominican co-op agency to get a truck for the co-op so they could transport their own grapes to market in

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the capital and increase their profit margin. That was such a momentous occasion for all. This meant gathering and loading the grapes all day and driving to Santo Domingo at night. Lou would show up at the house at times after midnight, exhausted, but happy for the success of the co-op. The ability for them to have their own truck and to market their own grapes was a significant step in the development of the co-op. I remember also watching Lou working with co-op members and helping them understand leadership, management, accounting, profit, and savings. Lou was a good and patient teacher.

And so, Sue and I and the kids have known Lou for 45 years. We have been blessed to know Mary and the Ferrand kids over the years. All of us eventually living in the Washington, DC area meant we would get together often and as a result formed a lasting friendship. We will miss our dear friend Lou.

If memory serves me well (which it doesn't always do anymore), I first met Lou in 1993, the year I returned from a three-year stint in PC/DR. I was a transplant to Northern Virginia, together with my Dominican wife, Carine, and we quickly looked for connections to the DR experience. Fondo Quisqueya was an obvious choice—as PCV and PCVL, I had sponsored two groups as recipients of FQ funding—and I remember among all the fine people I met from FQ that year this tall, well-spoken, and very gentlemanly figure, Lou Ferrand. I also remember his dry sense of humor, delivered with a contagious, transforming grin.

Over the years, as I continued my involvement with FQ, I learned more about Lou—his great work with the OAS, his committed involvement with other nonprofits, his passion for his family and the successes of his children as they moved into adulthood, and certainly his passion for FQ. He groomed me for the Treasurer position at FQ and I guess he knew, though I didn't, that he was grooming me for the President's position, too. Lou was a great mentor to me along the way, but he was also just a marvelous person who cared about others, always asking about my own health when I was going through some scary times, always gently chiding me if I didn't bring along Carine and the kids to FQ's annual picnic—because he really wanted to see them, and always thinking deeply about FQ's mission, the scholarship applications we debated, and how our resources could best benefit those we serve in the DR.

Thank you, Lou, for what you mean (present tense) to me, my family, and the many people you touched with your kindness and passion.

He was also involved in many other philanthropic groups and was a great father and husband. I very much enjoyed knowing him, working with him on the FQ Board, and being his friend.

FQ GRANTS HELP TWO WOMEN OPEN A NAIL SALON AND A HAIR SALON by PCV Brittany Hayes

Rosa Albania Genao is from La Cayota, Valverde and has a young son. She received a Fondo Quisqueya grant to complete a beautician course. The training has helped Rosa and her family greatly. Upon graduating from the beautician course, Rosa opened a nail salon in her house. She is the only woman who applies nails in her community, and her services are in great demand. Prior to taking the course, Rosa mostly worked cleaning houses of the richer families on the mountain. Now she is able to apply her skills and earn a more stable living. With the money she has earned from her nail salon, she has started building a house for her and her son; she will no longer need to live in someone else's home—a fact she takes much pride in. Thanks to the funding from Fondo Quisqueya, big possibilities have become attainable for Rosa.

Santa Disla Polanco is also from La Cayota, Valverde. She received an FQ grant to complete a beautician course where she learned how to style hair. Before graduating from beauty school, Santa only worked during coffee season (a few months a year) and earned meager wages which were not sufficient to support her family. She was constantly searching for a way to make ends meet and relied heavily on remittances from her family members in the U.S. However, following her completion of the beautician course, Santa now has a much more reliable source of income. Since graduation, she has opened a very successful hair salon in a room of her house and her family's standard of living has greatly improved. Thanks to the funding from Fondo Quisqueya, Santa was able to achieve her dream.

FONDO Q'S GRANTS AND SELECTION PROCESS

The Fondo Quisqueya Foundation, Inc. ("FQ") is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization which was formed in 1987 by former Peace Corps Volunteers and Staff who had served in the Dominican Republic ("DR") and who wanted to give something back to the DR. FQ was incorporated in Virginia in 1993.

FQ provides low-income Dominicans with scholarships and grants for both traditional and non-traditional in-country education and training to assist them in bettering their lives and to help them attain personal development, skills, and advancement. Grants may be to groups of individuals such as members of a coffee cooperative or a women's group.

FQ's grants and scholarships are made possible through donations and in-kind support from ex-PCVs and PC staff and other friends of the DR. FQ has no paid staff. Examples of courses funded include accounting, diesel mechanics, beautician school, barber training, driver training, worm composting, beekeeping, construction and cement skills, painting, journalism, mangrove restoration, ecotourism, inverter repair, graphic design, English, and computer classes. Funds can be used for tuition, transportation, books and materials, and other expenses associated with the course or training.

Each applicant must be sponsored by a member of the Dominican community or by a Peace Corps DR Volunteer or staff member.

Individual grants and scholarships usually do not exceed US\$300. FQ's Local DR Committee reviews grant applications quarterly and makes recommendations to FQ's Board of Directors for selection. Funds permitting, the Board seeks to fund at least a total of US\$3,000 in scholarships each quarter, for a yearly total of at least US\$12,000. Please donate now. Help our grantees help themselves.

FONDO Q GRANTEES

Fondo Q normally awards grants and scholarships four times per year. Applicants are screened by Fondo Q's Local DR Committee. Most of the awards are for \$300 or less. Below are summaries of the grants and scholarships awarded during the fall and winter quarters of 2012-13, which include 6 group awards benefitting more than 140 recipients in addition to 18 individual awards. These awards have provided funding for courses including kayak guide training; x-ray technician training; a public speaking course; technical information networking; English classes; and many others.

WHO WAS MILA BROOKS AND WHAT IS THE MILA BROOKS FUND? BY ANITA FRIEDMAN

Mila Brooks was a passionate, gregarious public servant who loved Latin America and spoke fluent Spanish and Portuguese. She loved perfume and you could pick up the heavy fragrance from far away. Mila served as the Country Director of Peace Corps DR from 1985 to 1987. She had been associated with Peace Corps in many capacities, as Deputy Director in Chile from 1973-74, and from 1969 -1973 as Midwestern Representative of the Office of Staff Placement and Special Assistant to the Director of Volunteer Placement. Mila spent many years as a consultant in international development specializing in Latin America for organizations including USAID and the Pan American Health Organization. A native Kansan, she graduated from the University of Kansas and studied at the University of Morelos, Cuernavaca, Mexico. In addition to her work in international development, she was a journalist and radio personality in Kansas and Mexico.

Mila was a staunch advocate for developing programs that promoted and empowered women's roles in development. In fact, as a Peace Corps Volunteer in Paraguay in the early 80s, I was privileged to be sent to an Inter-American Women in Development conference in Ecuador, where I first met Mila. Many years later, after she passed away, former Peace Corps Volunteers created the Mila Brooks Fund to honor her devotion to promoting women in development. Close to \$5,000 has been donated throughout the years to this fund, and there are currently funds available for grants and scholarships to promote education and training for Dominican women who are striving to improve their well-being and those of their families and communities. FQ GRANTEE OBTAINS DRIVERS LICENSE, EXPANDING HIS JOB OPPORTUNITIES

Daniel Minaya used his Fondo Q scholarship to complete a driver's education course in Puerto Plata. He first passed a written test to obtain his permit, and he then completed 20 private driving lessons with an instructor. He learned how to drive both automatic and stick shift cars, and he also studied the rules in order to be a safe driver. After completing the lessons, Daniel passed the driving test and obtained his license. He is very proud that he is now able to drive. Daniel says he had a very positive experience completing the driver's education course, and that having his license will help him improve his life. He is currently unemployed, but he is looking for a job and he hopes that he will have more opportunities now that he is prepared to take on a job that involves driving.


