With the most recent round of Fondo Q's grants and scholarships approved in October, 2009 we will have helped fund education and training opportunities for 374 low-income Dominicans this year at a cost of approximately \$14,700. Many of these grants were for group awards such as an award to 22 women to learn how to make artisan bags, an award to 15 members of a coffee cooperative for organic agriculture certification training, an award to 10 youth in a "Brigada Verde" group to learn about coral reef preservation, and an award to 25 youth for a business course on starting and managing their own business in their communities. Individual awards were given for computer and English classes, an HIV/AIDS program, an apprenticeship in masonry and woodworking, a beauty salon course, and many more. It is always amazing to me that a relatively small amount of money can go so far in helping individuals change their lives.

I know that these are difficult financial times for all of us. However, please contribute and help us to help low-income Dominicans who otherwise might not have the opportunity to learn and develop skills which can help them to change, in a positive way, their lives and those of their loved ones.

I wish you Happy Holidays and a Happy New Year.

FQ GRANTEE OPENS HER OWN BEAUTY SALON By PCV Alicia Srinivas, Puerto Plata

Claribel Reyes Rodriguez was awarded a Fondo Quisqueya scholarship in October 2008 to sponsor her attendance at a beauty school. This scholarship has really changed Claribel's life for the better, and I am amazed at how such a relatively small amount of money can go such a long way.

The money not only allowed her to attend the course, but also to buy start-up materials for her salon such as a blow-dryer, curling iron, shampoo, etc. Within about 2 months of attending the course, she converted the front part of her house into a salon and started doing hair on the side to buy more things for her salon that the grant couldn't cover. So far, she has bought a special sink for washing hair, a chair that goes up and down for cutting hair, and a hair dryer that you sit under – all with money she made on her own!

I would say the most positive change that has come out of this is that Claribel is now much more self-assured. As a person who never learned to read or write, she felt overly dependent on her husband, and she didn't think of herself as capable or competent. Now that she has her own source of income and is able to provide for her kids, she is happier and more confident. The town as a whole has also benefitted because it now has its own salon, saving the women expensive and uncomfortable trips to the nearby pueblo.

This newsletter highlights the grants and scholarships awarded this past spring and summer, which include nine group awards. These group grants are supporting courses and trainings ranging from an educational exchange for a women's group to learn how to make artisan bags to organic agriculture certification training for members of a coffee cooperative to painting classes for at-risk youth. For less than \$300, each of these group awards is providing training for up to 40 or more youth, men and women.

Recently, we have had more scholarship requests than our budget allows for. With the amount of giving that we have had in the past, we can provide \$3,000 each quarter, or \$12,000 per year. The quantity and quality of scholarship requests has been such that we have gone over our \$12,000 goal by approximately \$2,700 for this year.

I hope you will continue to remember Fondo Q in your annual giving plans so we can continue to fund these requests. Also, please contact us if you are interested in "planned giving" (putting us in your will).

TREASURER'S REPORT By Bill Threlkeld

Raise \$10,000 between now and the end of the year? Can we do it? I feel like NPR in its fall fundraising campaign, except I have no matching donations to offer!

If we can raise that amount, we will be in a much stronger position in 2010 to fund the first two rounds of scholarship candidates set to come to us in January and April. If our year had ended in September, our financial records would reveal that we are about \$3,600 short of covering our expenses in the calendar year.

Our total giving for scholarships/grants was about \$14,700 for the year. Our operational expenses thus far are about \$2,700 – all newsletter-related – but the newsletter you are presently reading will add another \$2,500 or so to our expenses for the year. These "loss" years are expected from time to time. Let's face it, at the moment nonprofits are struggling mightily across the board. Over the last two years, we've tapped into our endowment/reserve fund three times, for a total of about \$6,800, in order to stick with our goal of \$12,000 in scholarship/grants per year (\$3,000 per quarter).

Your generosity sustains this all-volunteer organization so that each year we can continue to give opportunities to dozens of goal-oriented, motivated low-income Dominicans seeking a way to better their lives. Our household budgets may seem stretched right now, but think how bad it must be for those we serve. As one Dominican friend told me, "When the U.S. has a cold, the Dominican Republic has pneumonia!" Please give generously this holiday season. Your checks and online donations are so appreciated.

NEW PEACE CORPS DIRECTOR ARRON WILLIAMS IS ONE OF US

On August 24, 2009, Aaron S. Williams was sworn in as the eighteenth Director of the Peace Corps. Aaron was nominated by President Obama on July 14 and confirmed by the U.S. Senate on August 7. On September 17, in a packed Shriver Hall at Peace Corps Headquarters, he was sworn-in by Sargent Shriver and former Senator Harris Wofford. At the ceremony, he reflected on his first four weeks on the job and announced his intent to focus on targeted growth, broad innovation across all operations and a commitment to bringing the Peace Corps Volunteer experience home to help promote a better American understanding of other nations and cultures. During his first few weeks, he also managed to make his first field trip to no other place than the DR.

Aaron Williams is one of us - a former Peace Corps Volunteer in the Dominican Republic (1967 - 1970) who married his Dominican wife, Rosa, and speaks fluent Spanish. Aaron has held a long and illustrious career in international development, including serving as coordinator of minority recruitment and project evaluation officer for the Peace Corps in his hometown of Chicago; USAID Director in South Africa during Nelson Mandela's administration; Executive Vice President of the International Youth Foundation; and most recently as Vice President for International Business Development at RTI International. Aaron is a graduate of Chicago State University, and he has an MBA from the University of Wisconsin.


It is wonderful to have such an experienced and dedicated

June 14, 2009 held as a wonderful afternoon for the FQ annual picnic/meeting. Tom and Sue Gittins provided a great back yard and sausages and hamburgers. Everyone brought side dishes to complement the feast.

FQ President Lou Ferrand discussed plans for the next year. Our goal is to give out at least \$3,000 in grants and scholarships each quarter, totaling at least \$12,000 per year. Most grants and scholarships are for \$300 or less.

In addition, Lou talked about what a small amount of money can do. For example, a FQ grant is paying for teachers at a computer lab near San Cristobal to give computer classes to more than 30 Dominicans.

Elections were held for Fondo Q Board members and officers. BJ Warren, Bill Threlkeld, and Anne Kopley were nominated and elected to new three-year terms. Laura Sundquist, an ex-PCV who served as FQ liaison during her service, was elected as a new Board member. Officers elected are: President, Lou Ferrand; Vice President, BJ Warren; Secretary, Karen Clough; and Treasurer, Bill Threlkeld. Tom Gittins will continue as Events Chair and Joanna Mauer will continue as Newsletter Editor.

Some of us "early" PC folks had conversations with people from our group who lived in the DC Metropolitan area but who we had not kept in touch with. Nobody in the group could remember the number for us. Were we DR 5 or DR 7? We were there from 1963-1965. One thing we did agree upon, however, was that our PC experience was the best thing we had ever accomplished in our mostly colorful lives.

FQ SCHOLARSHIP HELPS YOUNG AGRICULTURAL WORKER PREPARE FOR A UNIVERSITY EDUCATION

Manuel (Chelo) has tackled his studies in computers and English with his characteristic good-humor and enthusiasm, despite his family's difficult financial situation.

With the assistance of the Fondo Quisqueya scholarship he received in the spring of 2009, Chelo started his weekend English and Computer classes at the IDONAI Institute in San José de Ocoa. He has since completed one full trimester in Beginning English and Basic Computers and will be finishing his studies under this scholarship at the end of November 2009.

When I last saw Chelo, we spoke a bit in English so he could show off some of what he has learned. He has improved a lot and was able to carry on a few basic conversations with me with only minimal assistance. He has a good command of his vocabulary to express his emotions, likes and dislikes, and can respond to a few basic questions in informal conversations. In addition, Chelo is learning material from a phrase book he found with specific work-related vocabulary. He is always launching newlylearned phrases when he sees me, asking me to critique his pronunciation and usage.

When I ask about his computer classes, he says that he is learning typing, word-processing, and how to use the Internet. He has opened an e-mail account for himself and says that he enjoys searching the web for different topics.

Unfortunately, the economic condition of Chelo's family has not improved this past year due to bad weather and a poor tomato crop. Although he recently graduated from high school, Chelo is planning on putting off college for at least a year in order to accept an offer of a paying job

in Santo Domingo. By working in a family friend's *colmado* and sending cash home to the family, Chelo hopes to help his parents through this difficulty.

Despite this delay of his educational plans, Chelo approaches his situation with a positive attitude. He is still very much intent on pursuing a university education and would like to study abroad, where his newly acquired English skills will be very important.

FONDO Q'S GRANT & SELECTION PROCESS

The Fondo Quisqueya Foundation, Inc. ("FQ") is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization which was formed in 1987 by former U.S. Peace Corps Volunteers and Staff who had served in the Dominican Republic ("DR") and who wanted to give something back to the DR. FQ was incorporated in Virginia in 1993.

FQ provides low-income Dominicans with scholarships and grants for both traditional and nontraditional in-country education and training to assist them in bettering their lives and to help them attain personal development, skills, and advancement. Grants may be to groups of individuals such as members of a coffee cooperative or a women's group.

FQ's grants and scholarships are made possible through donations and in-kind support from ex-PCVs and PC staff and other friends of the DR. FO has no paid staff. Examples of courses funded include nursing school, beautician school, accounting, sustainable agriculture, sewing, driver training, electronics repair, diesel mechanics, worm composting, beekeeping, construction and cement skills, painting, and English and computer classes. Funds can be used for tuition, transportation, books and materials, and other expenses associated with the course or training.

Each applicant must be sponsored by a member of the Dominican community or by a Peace Corps DR Volunteer or staff member.

Individual grants and scholarships usually do not exceed US\$300. FQ's Local DR Committee reviews grant applications quarterly and makes recommendations to FQ's Board of Directors for selection. Funds permitting, the Board seeks to fund at least a total of US\$3,000 in scholarships each quarter, for a yearly total of at least US\$12,000.

FONDO Q GRANTEES

Fondo Q normally awards grants and scholarships four times per year. Applicants are screened by Fondo Q's Local DR Committee. Most of the awards are for \$300 or less. Below are summaries of the grants and scholarships awarded during the spring and summer quarters of 2009, which include nine group awards for 260 recipients and 20 individual awards. These awards have provided funding for courses in subjects including inverter repair, installation and fabrication; accounting; masonry and woodworking; organic agriculture certification; painting; English; computers; and renewable energy.

PCV Amy Martin wrote: "The communities of Mata Grande and La Ciénega, Manabao are sister communities, as they are both located at entrances to Parque Nacional Armando Bermudez, the national park where Pico Duarte is located. A taller was established in La Ciénega for a women's group to begin a sewing project to sell products at the visitor center of the park. This taller has been a great success and the women have produced amazing artisan bags using traditional techniques (in the pattern of mule saddles), and the bags are now in high demand. The technique of sewing artisan bags has been introduced to the Mata Grande women's group, and they have worked together to make a few bags. However, they are lacking expertise in technique and organization that is found in the women's group in La Ciénaga. This FQ grant would allow for three representatives from the women's group in La Ciénega to give a training session to the women's group in Mata Grande and for three representatives from Mata Grande to visit an established and functioning sewing workshop in La Ciénega."

After taking time away from school to raise her three kids, Linda returned to school four years ago, taking classes on weekends and evenings at San José de Ocoa's program for adults. She graduated from


