Peace Corps is Back!

Thirty-four PCVs and trainees are back in the DR after the pandemic hiatus. They are among the first PCVs to return to the field world-wide. Several FQ board members met recently with country director Jennifer McGowan in Washington who brought the good news. She hopes to be back to full capacity within the next year or so, receiving two groups of 35 trainees each year. All of the Volunteers will be working in various levels of education. COVID precautions have meant that life will be somewhat different but still promises the full Peace Corps experience. Jennifer told us that Dominican agencies and programs have been very receptive and are anxious to re-incorporate volunteers into their activities.

Brigada Verde Update: Two New Scholars!

The joint FQ/FDR program has two new recipients – Ramon Antonio Candelario Brito, 20, and Julian Gabriel Veras Figuereo, 23. Both were selected from their graduating class at the National Environmental School in Jarabacoa (ITESMARENA). Ramon grew up in Nagua and will major in civil engineering at the Universidad Dominicana O&M in Santo Domingo. Julian, from Cambita Garabitos, will attend the Universidad Nacional Evangelico in Santo Domingo, majoring in agricultural forestry engineering. Both students are from very modest means and were outstanding students at the two-year ITESMARENA. They were chosen by a joint FQ/FDR committee based upon recommendations by the faculty of ITESMARENA. The FQ/FDR program provides \$3,000/year for four years for each student.

Lou Ferrand Scholars


